LACROSSE 101

A thumbnail look at Minnesota's newest professional sport:

The game: Lacrosse often is compared to hockey because of personnel and equipment. Players use sticks with webbed pockets at the tip to pass and shoot a solid rubber ball toward nets. But the game's strategy most resembles basketball. There is frequent scoring, plus use of a shot clock (30 seconds). Teams on offense usually spread the floor and pass with the frequency of a basketball attack.

The history: First played by American Indians as recreation and to settle disputes between tribes instead of going to war.

The league: National Lacrosse League, founded 1987. Eleven teams play a 16-game schedule between January and April.
